Storage changes

What are the changes Microsoft is making to Microsoft 365 storage?

Microsoft is introducing changes to our storage offerings across our Microsoft 365 for Education suite. Beginning at your next contract renewal, but no sooner than August 1, 2024*, all institutions' tenants will receive 100TB of free pooled storage across OneDrive, SharePoint, and Exchange, with an additional 50GB or 100GB of pooled storage per paid user for A3 and A5 subscriptions, respectively (not including Student Use Benefits). With pooled storage, an institution's total storage limit is the maximum amount of storage all users combined can use.

In addition, effective February 1, 2024, users of Office 365 A1 (free subscription) are limited to a maximum of 100GB of OneDrive storage within the institutional tenant's 100TB of pooled storage. Institutions have the option to purchase additional incremental storage based on their needs. Some of the benefits we expect to see include helping institutions reduce some of the security risks associated with legacy storage and data sprawl, a top concern for most chief risk officers, while also reducing our shared environmental footprint.

*Important Note: Technical enforcement begins August 1, 2024. Today, most institutions (~99.9%) are well below their storage allotment. For any mid-enrolment customer over that storage limit on August 1, 2024, Microsoft will provide additional storage to address pooled storage overage at no cost through the length of the customer's current term. To avoid any disruptions to services, customers will need to contact your Microsoft representative to acquire additional storage.

Why is Microsoft making these changes to Microsoft 365 storage?

With the move to the cloud, stored files, data, and unused accounts have increased significantly over time, as more and more stored files and data have proliferated without a plan for end-of-life. This is not sustainable from a cost perspective, and it puts education institutions and their students at risk for a data breach. Education was the [third most targeted industry](#) by cybercriminals in Q2 2024.

In addition, stored files no longer in use have an impact on our carbon footprint, with over half of all data stored by organizations not serving a useful purpose. Storage of this "dark" data takes up space on servers and results in increased electricity consumption, generating 4% of global greenhouse gas

emissions in 2020 alone.¹ Microsoft is committed to both the security and privacy of institutional and student data as well as reducing our collective carbon footprint. Already, our datacenters are built with the highest environmental standards in mind. With this change, education customers can help do their part.

Finally, Microsoft's mission in education is to empower students, faculty, and education institutions to achieve more. To achieve this mission, Microsoft continues to innovate on new technology, tools and services for educators, such as the new [Learning Accelerators](#) to help students with reading and other essential skills. Today, Microsoft provides Office 365 and Microsoft 365 for Education suites built for education through free software grants or at significant discounts from commercial pricing. With these new updates, we can continue to invest in meaningful innovation while offering those services to more institutions around the world.

What does this mean for institutions?

To help institutions with this transition, Microsoft is delivering a set of free tools to help manage the process end-to-end, including tools to visualize current storage allocation and usage across OneDrive, SharePoint and Exchange, and tools to more easily manage stored data and end-of-life stored files that are no longer needed. Today, most institutions (~99.9%) are well below their storage allotment. With new tools, all institutions can now better manage their information and set thoughtful policies for governance. When will my storage limits go into effect?

The storage limits go into effect Aug 1, 2024. For institutions whose contracts were signed prior to August 1, 2023, and are approaching or over their storage limit, you can request storage packs through the end of your current contract period through your Microsoft representative. *Student Use Benefit (SUB) does NOT contribute to the pooled storage; it consumes against the pooled storage.



Pooled storage

How much storage is our institution currently entitled to?

Every institution's tenant has a 100TB base storage capacity. Microsoft 365 and Office 365 A3 and A5 paid user licenses add 50GB or 100GB respectively to the pool of storage. In addition, institutions can purchase additional pooled storage in 10TB increments for \$300 estimated retail USD monthly to add to the tenant pool.

To find your capacity, use this calculation: $100\text{TB} + (\#A3 \text{ paid users} \times 50\text{GB}) + (\#A5 \text{ paid users} \times 100 \text{GB}) + (\text{additional storage purchased}) = \text{capacity/limit}$.

Here's an example:

$$\begin{aligned} & 100 \text{ TB Default Limit (102,400 GB)} \\ & + 500 \text{ A3 Faculty Licenses (25,000 GB)} \\ & + 1,000 \text{ A5 Faculty Licenses (100,000 GB)} \\ & + 3 \times 10\text{TB Storage Packs (30,720 GB)} \\ & \text{-----} \\ & = \text{Total Pooled Storage Allocation/Limit (258,120 GB)} \end{aligned}$$

How do I find out how much storage we are using today?

To find out how much storage your institution's tenant is using, you can pull the storage report from the Microsoft 365 Admin Center. To do so, visit admin.microsoft.com and follow this path: Microsoft 365 Admin Center > Reports > Storage.

Which role-based access control roles are required to view the Microsoft 365 Admin Center storage page?

Admins need to be assigned either the Global Admin role or the SharePoint Admin role to view the storage dashboard.

What services are included in the pooled storage?

Pooled storage provides the total storage capacity and tenant wide limit for OneDrive, SharePoint Online, and Exchange Online. All active SharePoint sites are included in Pooled storage. All OneDrives are included in Pooled Storage. All Exchange user, group, and shared mailboxes are included in Pooled Storage. Archives SharePoint sites are not included in Pooled storage. Exchange Public Folders, Archive mailboxes, and Discovery mailboxes are not included in pooled storage.

Will archive mailboxes be included?

No, pooled storage only counts and includes user, shared, and group mailboxes. Archive mailboxes, public folders and discovery mailboxes are not included in the pooled storage limit. Enabling Archive Mailboxes with MRM policy in Exchange is often one of the best methods to reduce your overall storage profile and consumption against the EDU pooled storage limit.

What counts towards EDU pooled storage if retention policies are enabled?

All content retained within a user's primary mailbox will count toward the EDU pooled storage limit. All content retained within the user's Archive Mailbox will not count against the EDU pooled storage limit. If you enable retention policy with the default Policy Tag (DPT) of Move Item to Archive, the items retained will not count against the EDU Pooled storage limit. What counts towards EDU pooled storage if In-Place Hold or Litigation Hold are enabled?

All items and content within the user's Primary Mailbox will count against EDU pooled storage, while all items and content in the user's Archive Mailbox will not count against EDU Pooled Storage. What counts towards pooled storage when users are inactive, de-licensed, or deleted?

When a user becomes inactive, all content for the user counts against the EDU pooled storage limit in the same way as when they were active. Microsoft recommends removing inactive users when they are

no longer needed, or enabling archive policy to reduce inactive users' overall storage consumption against the EDU Pooled Storage Limit if they must be retained.

When a user's Exchange Online license is removed, the user's mailbox will be triggered for deletion. The mailbox will be soft deleted when the license is removed, and the mailbox will then be retained for 30 days, before the mailbox is permanently deleted. When a user's OneDrive license is removed, the OneDrive becomes unlicensed. IT Admins may delete the unlicensed OneDrive using the [Remove-SPOSite](#) and [Remove-SPODeletedSite](#) PowerShell cmdlets and reclaim the space against the EDU Pooled Storage limit. When a user account is deleted, the user's mailbox will be triggered for deletion. The mailbox will be soft deleted when the license is removed, and the mailbox will then be retained for 30 days, before the mailbox is permanently deleted. When a user is deleted, the user's OneDrive is also tagged for deletion. The OneDrive is first moved to the Recycle bin for 30 days and then retained for an additional 93 days before being permanently deleted. What are the differences in storage across Microsoft 365 licenses?

Office 365 A1 is a free license that does not add to the pooled storage allotment. Microsoft has set a maximum OneDrive limit of 100GB for free Office 365 A1 users beginning in February 2024. Free Office 365 A1 users consume against the total pooled storage, and IT Admins have the flexibility to set a lower limit to better manage pooled storage across users.

Microsoft 365 A3 and A5 users contribute 50GB and 100GB respectively to the pool of storage for the institution. The 100GB maximum limit ONLY applies to Office 365 A1 users, and A3/A5 users will not receive limits unless set by the IT admin.

Do Student Use Benefit users or alumni users count against the storage pool?

Paid users contribute to the storage pool. Student Use Benefits (SUB) and alumni do not contribute to the pool. However, all users—including SUB and alumni—consume storage from the pool. Microsoft recommends setting limits across user groups to better manage the pool of storage in the institution’s tenant.



What tools and resources is Microsoft providing to help me manage storage?

To help institutions with this transition, Microsoft is delivering a set of free tools to help manage the process end-to-end, including tools to visualize current storage allocation and usage across OneDrive, SharePoint and Exchange, as well as tools to more easily manage stored data or end-of-life stored files that are no longer needed. Can I tell who is overusing their storage allocation?

There is a [top storage report](#) (Add hyperlink then delete these instructions) that shows the limit and consumption for the top 5,000 mailboxes, OneDrive accounts and SharePoint sites. You will be able to identify anyone who appears as a top 1,000 consumer of storage.

If I’m under the storage limit, how does this impact my institution?

You can work with the sales team and/or your Microsoft partner to examine your current data consumption, your rate of consumption growth and any plans you have in the future for information management. You can determine whether or not you will approach this shared data cap in coming years so you can plan appropriately. Microsoft recommends that all institutions begin to plan and implement thoughtful storage policies for managing storage in the long term. What should I do if I'm approaching or over the storage limit?

If your institution's tenant is over the storage limit or approaching the storage limit, you have a few options:

- Set limits and clean up existing storage, referencing the [Microsoft 365 Storage Guidance eBook](#)
- Purchase additional paid user licenses to add to your pool of storage (50GB for Microsoft 365 A3 and 100 for A5 licenses)
- Purchase additional storage in increments of 10TB (\$300 USD estimated retail/month)

What happens if my institution's tenant is over the storage limit?

Admins will receive warning notifications at 80% and 90% tenant storage capacity. At 100% capacity, the admin will receive another notification and 30 days to take action. After 30 days, the storage will be locked in a read-only state for both SharePoint and OneDrive if no action has been taken.

Exchange will remain unaffected. Your users can continue to receive and send information. You will be able to delete content from OneDrive and SharePoint. Microsoft recommends either cleaning up storage and removing sites or content or increasing your storage capacity through additional A3 or A5 licenses, additional storage packs, or cold storage options like Azure Files or Azure Blob storage.

For any mid-enrolment customer over that storage limit on August 1, 2024, Microsoft will provide additional storage at no cost through the length of the customer's current term. To avoid any disruptions to services, customers will need to contact your Microsoft representative to acquire additional storage.

What happens if my Office 365 A1 users exceed the 100GB limit?

Users will receive warning notifications when approaching the storage limit. The default notification level is at 90% storage capacity. At 100% capacity, the user's OneDrive will be limited to read-only access. Users won't be able to upload, edit or sync new files to OneDrive, and existing files will remain as read-only. However, users can still download files, delete files and empty recycle bins.

Should I deploy multiple tenants vs a single tenant?

Microsoft recommends deploying into a single tenant whenever possible. Multiple tenants are difficult to manage effectively, requiring duplication for every operational task. It's easy to end up with incongruent settings across tenants. You will also get additional storage capacity limits against your pool. Office 365 A1 in every tenant will receive the same max limit in Exchange, SharePoint and OneDrive.

What happens if I have commercial licenses (E3 or E5 licenses) in my education tenant?

If your tenant has assigned a majority of (greater than 50%) EDU licenses compared to non-EDU licenses, or if your tenant has purchased more EDU licenses than non-EDU licenses, the tenant will be managed as an EDU tenant and will be subject to Education Pooled Storage. The pooled storage limit is in addition to other various service level and user level limits specified within this service description documentation. Can I allocate space to a specific user?

IT admins can allocate OneDrive and Exchange mailbox storage at an individual user level. All storage consumed in both locations will count against the tenant's storage pool.

Pooled storage cannot be allocated at the individual user level, because non-user specific storage locations that aren't attributed to an individual (like group mailboxes, shared mailboxes, and SharePoint sites) also consume against the centralized pool of storage.

Is this limit a technical limit or a licensing limit?

Both. Admins will receive warning notifications at 80% and 90% tenant storage capacity. At 100% capacity, the admin will receive another notification and 30 days to take action. After 30 days, the storage will be locked in a read-only state if no action has been taken. The tenant will be locked for both SharePoint and OneDrive. Exchange will remain unaffected. Your users can continue to receive and send emails. You will be able to delete content from OneDrive and SharePoint.

What is the OneDrive deletion process and how does it affect storage consumption?

When a user account is deleted, their respective OneDrive is tagged for deletion. 30 days after the user account is deleted, the OneDrive is moved to the Recycle Bin. This 30 day setting can be configured by IT using the [Set-SPOTenant](#) PowerShell cmdlet. The OneDrive will remain in the Recycle Bin for 93 days more before it is fully deleted and no longer recoverable. Once a OneDrive is fully deleted, it will no longer be counted against the EDU pooled storage limit. Any OneDrive which has not been fully deleted will count against the EDU pooled storage limit. What happens if I remove a user's OneDrive license, and how does it affect storage consumption?

When a OneDrive license is removed, the OneDrive is retained indefinitely without an owner. The only action which triggers a OneDrive for deletion is when a user account is deleted. IT admins can forcibly delete an unlicensed OneDrive and reduce their overall storage profile using these two PowerShell cmdlets: [Remove-SPOSite](#) and [Remove-SPODeletedSite](#).



Purchasing additional storage

How do I get additional storage?

Institutions can upgrade users to paid licenses and additionally have the option to purchase storage in 10TB increments to add to the pooled storage for the tenant.

There are several ways to manage the need for storage:

- 1) Clean up current storage or delete files or inactive accounts
- 2) Upgrade or purchase paid Microsoft 365 licenses that add to the pool of storage (A3 provides 50GB/per user, A5 provides 100GB per user).
- 3) Purchase storage packs that provide 10TB of pooled storage

- 4) Use Microsoft 365 Archive to store inactive SharePoint content and unlicensed OneDrive accounts. For more information, visit [this link](#).
- 5) Look at other solutions such as Azure Files or Azure Blob storage to meet storage requirements

What if I don't want to buy more storage?
